Having 93 counties in Nebraska does not make sense. The latest study released today by the Platte Institute for Economic Research concludes that eliminating 65 counties, thereby dropping the total number to 28, makes much more geographical sense.



The report, authored by Dr. Paul Burger and Dr. H. Jason Combs of the University of Nebraska-Kearney, states that Nebraska counties were originally designed to be, "small enough that any resident of a county could journey to the seat of government on horseback or by stagecoach, transact business, and return home before nightfall."
